■ NYDIS ED Elected to HSC Board of Directors

NYDIS Executive Director, Peter Gudaitis, was elected as a new member of the Board of Directors of the Human Services Council (HSC) on December 13. The HSC Board consists of Standing Members, organizations that are federations or coalitions that are elected as Members at Large. HSC asked NYDIS to be a Standing Member of the Board. The HSC, "The Voice of the Human Services Community," represents thousands of not-for-profit organizations to build broad recognition and support for the not-for-profit human service sector to the citizens and the fabric of NYC. Through advocacy, information, collaboration, and technical assistance, member organizations are backed by the entire sector in addressing their concerns on issues of public policy, economic trends, and regulatory environment.

■ NYDIS Visited by CRC to Aid WTC Recovery Workers

On December 11 representatives from the Canadian Red Cross visited NYDIS for a day of discussion and in-service training on how the NYC 9/11 Unmet Needs Roundtable funds might be used to support the recovery plans of Canadian Mohawk ironworkers that are sick due to their participation in the WTC cleanup effort. Currently a group of Canadian Mohawk ironworkers regularly travel to the Mt. Sinai Hospital for ongoing treatment for WTC related illnesses.

■ NYDIS ED Keynotes Philadelphia Clergy Conference

Peter Gudaitis was the keynote speaker at a conference for Philadelphia religious leaders entitled, "Uniting Communities to Prepare For and Respond to Disasters" hosted by the local ARC chapter. Held on December 7, the conference was intended to educate key leaders within Philadelphia's faith community to become active VOAD/Citizen Corps volunteers and to attend preparedness trainings. Gudaitis emphasized the importance of the faith-based community to communicate and collaborate with each other.

■ NYDIS & NYCOSH Publicize Worker Comp Deadline

NYDIS is joining the NY Committee for Occupational Safety and Health (NYCOSH) in collaboration with the NYS AFL-CIO, WTC Medical Monitoring Program, the Laborers' Health and Safety Trust Fund, the Business and Labor Coalition of New York, workers' compensation law firms, the UCC-National Disaster Ministries, and Wall Street Rising, is mounting a



media campaign to inform workers throughout the country about the necessity of registering for workers' compensation. Joel Shufro, NYCOSH Executive Director, said, "We know that tens of thousands of people are at risk of becoming ill as a result of their exposure to toxic air and to psychological trauma while doing rescue, recovery or cleanup work after 9/11. We want to ensure that every one of them registers with the Workers' Compensation Board before the August 14, 2007, deadline. And if they don't know about the program, they won't register, it's that simple."

■ **NYDIS at Conference on Avian Flu's Impact on Business**

NYDIS' Autumn Brown attended "Avian Flu: Ethical, Financial, and Management Implications for Business," a conference presented by the



Robert Zicklin Center for Corporate Integrity at Baruch College, on December 1. Panels included experts in public health and ethics, prompting discussions on how to reduce opportunities for human infection, what public health officials, the media, and the public might expect employers to do to keep their employees safe, and how government should balance the demands of public safety and business continuity. Houses of Worship are a particularly vulnerable business that needs to have continuity plans in place.

■ **NYDIS Presents at Chinese Community Meeting**

On November 30 Maggie Jarry spoke to a group of 9/11-affected Chinatown residents at the Chinese Benevolent Association. The presentation included discussion of ongoing recovery aid available via the NYC 9/11 Unmet Needs Roundtable and the partnership between NYDIS and Hamilton Madison House - Chinatown Resource in assisting Chinese community residents that qualify and are actively creating recovery plans for presentation at the Roundtable. The meeting drew coverage from three major Chinese newspapers, including the World Journal, the Sing Tao Daily and the China Press. Since this meeting, Hamilton Madison House has seen a significant increase in calls from 9/11-affected Chinatown residents.

■ **NYDIS Coordinates Events to Support 9/11 Case Managers**

On November 20, NYDIS partnered with the World Cares Center-Lower Manhattan (WCC), the NY Psychiatric Institute, Faithful Response and the donor representatives at all three 9/11 Unmet Needs Roundtables to present two trainings, Meet and Greet the Donors, and a Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) Seminar for 9/11 service providers. Both events were co-hosted by NYDIS and the WCC and were attended by over 45 service providers from 22 agencies.

- **Meet and Greet the Donors** was an informal lunch followed by a panel discussion Q&A session with the donor representatives at the 9/11 Unmet Needs Roundtables.
- **PTSD Seminar for 9/11 Service Providers** included presentations on recognizing and supporting staff with compassion fatigue and tools for working with clients that suffer from PTSD. Presenters were Tom Taylor of Faithful Response and Roberto Lewis-Fernandez, M.D., Michelle McNamara, Psy.D. and Eun Jung Suh, Ph.D. of the NY Psychiatric Institute.
- **Latino Cultural Competency Training** was presented by Elba Montalvo, Executive Director of the Committee for Hispanic Children and Families, whose new offices in Lower Manhattan held the event. Attended by 21 service providers from 13 agencies, it focused on recognizing cultural biases and norms within the service provider community and how that impacts effectively working with clients from the Latino community.

■ **Congress Changes FEMA Policy in Post-Katrina**

The Congressional Research Service recently published a new report, *Federal Emergency Management Policy Changes After Hurricane Katrina: A Summary of Statutory Provisions*, which summarizes the recent legislation and the impact on FEMA and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS). Reports issued by committees of the 109th Congress, the White House, federal offices of Inspector General, and the Government Accountability Office (GAO) concluded that the losses caused by Katrina were due, in part, to deficiencies such as questionable leadership decisions and capabilities, organizational failures, overwhelmed preparation and communication systems, and inadequate statutory authorities. From these conclusions, the 109th Congress revised federal emergency management policies vested in the President; reorganized FEMA; and enhanced and clarified the mission, functions, and authorities of the agency, as well as those of its parent, the DHS.

■ **Senators Ask President to Fund 9/11 Medical Needs**

On December 1, Senator Clinton, along with Senators Schumer and Kennedy, called on the President to include funding in the upcoming Fiscal Year 2008 for medical and mental treatment and for the monitoring of 9/11 first responders, workers, students, residents, and volunteers whose health has been jeopardized. In a letter to the President, the Senators also asked that the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) be prepared to provide funding for any gap in existing programs for medical and mental health monitoring and treatment until legislation is passed that addresses the long term needs. The Senators have introduced legislation called the 9/11 Heroes Health Improvement Act of 2006



and will reintroduce legislation next year when the 110th Congress convenes calling for \$1.9 billion in funding to address these ongoing needs.

■ **Clinton Introduces Disaster Mental Health Bill**

Additionally, Senator Clinton introduced the Public Mental Health Emergency Preparedness Act of 2006, which, with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), would establish the National Center for Public Mental Health Emergency Preparedness to address mental health concerns and coordinate and implement the development and delivery of mental health services in the event of bioterrorism or other public health emergency. Bill S.3537 was introduced in the second session of the 109th Congress on June 20, 2006.

■ **Link Between 9/11 Site Exposure and Cancer**

In the Village Voice article, "Death by Dust: The Frightening Link Between the 9/11 Toxic Cloud and Cancer", Kristen Lombardi tells the story of Ernie Vallebuona, who, three years after a three-month stint as a rescue and recovery worker at Ground Zero, received the diagnosis of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma—a rare stage-three aggressive cancer. To date, 75 recovery workers have been diagnosed with blood cell cancers that were medically confirmed as having been likely caused by exposure to 9/11. Those 75 cases have come to light in joint-action lawsuits filed against NYC on behalf of at least 8,500 recovery workers from Ground Zero who all suffer from the debilitating effects of those events. Of the 8,500 people now suing the city, 400, or about 5 percent, have cancer, most are men, aged 30 to 60, who appeared in perfect health just five years ago.

■ **EPA's Lower Manhattan Test and Clean Program**

In the final phase of its response to 9/11, the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced on December 6 the beginning of a program to test indoor spaces in Lower Manhattan. The program, which covers the area south of Canal Street and west of Allen and Pike Streets, will allow residents and building owners to have the air and dust in their units tested for four contaminants associated with dust from the collapse of the WTC. Registration for the program will begin mid-January and run for two months.

- **Nadler Critical of New EPA WTC Testing & Cleanup**

On December 6, NYC Congressman Jerrold Nadler criticized the EPA for issuing an inadequate testing and cleanup program for WTC contamination. The new plan does not reflect the recommendations of the EPA Inspector General issued in August 2003, or the WTC Expert Technical Review Panel established by EPA specifically to develop a scientifically sound plan for indoor contamination. The new program will allow residents to test for only four contaminants (asbestos, lead, PAHs, and man-made vitreous fibers), on a voluntary basis, and if necessary, have their residence cleaned. A total of \$7 million has been allocated for the program.

At the request of Rep. Nadler, Sen. Clinton, and Sen. Jeffords, the GAO has been conducting a study of EPA's WTC indoor testing and cleanup program, and the EPA's disbandment of the "Technical Review Panel." GAO is expected to include a review of the new EPA testing and cleanup plan as part of its study; a draft report is expected in March, 2007.

- **NYCOSH: EPA Clean-Up Plan Completely Ineffective**

The New York Committee for Occupational Safety and Health (NYCOSH) issued a statement on December 6 on EPA's plan concerning contamination resulting from the collapse of the WTC. "After conducting one completely ineffective cleanup program in 2002 and then dawdling for nearly three years before beginning a program that will allegedly correct the deficiencies of the first effort, EPA has insulted everyone who works, lives or studies in Lower Manhattan by offering a new cleanup plan that is scarcely better than the first one. In particular, EPA once again refuses to clean contaminated workplaces, even though there is not a scintilla of evidence that workplaces are any less likely to be contaminated than residences. The approximately 1,500 commercial and institutional buildings in Lower Manhattan, including offices, schools, government buildings, and firehouses, are excluded from the cleanup program. There is no scientific or legal basis for this exclusion."



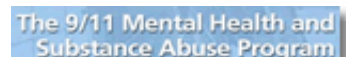

■ Deutsche Bank Dismantling Begins at WTC Site

Workers started to dismantle the facade of the former Deutsche Bank building on December 8 as a prelude to its demolition, which is to begin in January, according to the Lower Manhattan Construction Command Center. The building stands opposite Ground Zero at 130 Liberty Street, and was badly damaged and contaminated on 9/11.

■ Annual NYC Hunger Survey Just Published

The NYC Coalition Against Hunger released their annual survey on hunger, "Hunger Hangs On: NYC Food Pantries and Soup Kitchens Still Overwhelmed," which details how the number of people forced to use the city's pantries and kitchens continues to increase despite recent increases in the stock market. The Coalition also cites federal data from the US Department of Agriculture and the Human Resources Administration to corroborate many of the survey's findings. The Coalition's annual survey is the best known yearly report on hunger. Addressing the root causes of hunger make at risk communities more resilient in times of crisis and disaster.

■ New National Symbol for Emergency Management

The stylized letters "EM" will be used by state and local emergency managers as an icon in a new campaign to help make people more aware of what emergency management does to protect lives and property. "We think it's important to have a recognizable symbol," said Bruce Baughman, president of the National Emergency Management Association. "If people see that symbol on web sites, on the sides of government vehicles, on crates of emergency relief supplies and on preparedness material, they'll more easily recognize the efforts to make their lives safer and more secure and hopefully become more involved in the process."

■ NCORP: Evacuating Disabled Must Be a Priority

On November 30, the National Council on Readiness and Preparedness (NCORP) met in Charleston, SC, where they discussed the need for communities to formulate plans for evacuating disabled and special needs residents. Advocates for the handicapped stated that Katrina was the first lesson in which thousands of those who were left behind either were physically unable to rescue themselves or were in the care of someone who was ill-equipped for the disaster. For example, FEMA trailers aren't easily accessible for the handicapped, and there are no national standards covering shelters and the disabled.

■ FDNY's Elite EMS Disaster Specialists

NYC has an elite squad of "combat" paramedics trained to reach and navigate the crevices of collapsed buildings, bridges, tunnels and roads to aid injured and trapped survivors, reports the NY Post. Fifty-two FDNY rescue medics will be ready to work alongside the NYPD and firefighters deep in the rubble of any NYC disaster caused by a terrorist attack or natural catastrophe. They will administer medicine and fluids to victims who previously had to wait hours, or sometimes days, for treatment. "Our Emergency Medical Service can now provide the most advanced pre-hospital care to patients fighting for their lives in the most perilous situations," Chief of EMS John Peruggia said. "With this new training, our paramedics can administer treatment faster than ever before, which could ultimately mean the difference between life and death."

■ FEMA Ordered to Resume Katrina Payments

Katrina victims won two court battles this week but both victories could be short-lived. On November 29, a federal judge said the administration must immediately resume housing payments for thousands of people displaced by the hurricane. US District Judge Richard Leon said FEMA mishandled the transition from a short-term housing program to a longer-term program. Until FEMA explains itself and allows victims to appeal, Leon said the government must keep making housing payments.

On November 27, a federal judge in Louisiana said that many homeowners might be entitled to more insurance money for flood damage, but insurers pledged to appeal. US District Judge Stanwood Duval Jr. sided with homeowners who argued that the language in some insurance policies that excluded water damage was ambiguous. If successful, this suit could cost insurers \$1 billion in

Louisiana alone and could lead to similar suits elsewhere.

■ **Western NY Still Affected by October Snowstorm**

October's early season snowstorm slammed Western NY, leaving at least 400,000 people without power, some for more than a week. Now, 16,000 families have registered for individual assistance with FEMA.



Don Weaver, chair of the new Disaster Recovery Interfaith Network of Western New York, said that "food was an issue because of people being without power for so long. There were long lines at food pantries." He adds, "many others still need debris cleared from their property...and getting limbs and trees removed especially for the disabled and the elderly." The Disaster Recovery Interfaith Network will also help the area better prepare for future disasters - but for now Weaver is urging people to think about current needs.

■ **New Communications Center in DC**

On November 28, the National Council on Readiness and Preparedness reports that a new Washington DC command center made up of 18 regional first responders will now be able to communicate with each other and members of federal, regional, state and local governments during an emergency. Through this new Unified Communications Center (UCC), eight years in the making, signals the creation of a new multi-platform and interoperable communications platform that will link emergency management and response in the area. Costing more than \$106 million, it will help eliminate inefficiencies, jammed lines of communication and create a more streamlined approach to emergency management and victim triage.

■ **FEMA Increases Post-Disaster Rental Assistance**

FEMA has adopted a new interim policy under which it may raise the maximum amount it will pay for rental housing when affordable housing is in short supply after a major disaster. This means that FEMA will be able to increase the authorized amount of rental assistance when it determines that higher market rates have affected the availability of affordable rental housing. This authority applies to counties designated for Individual Assistance in the disaster declaration as well as to non-designated counties that are hosting eligible disaster victims. When a disaster impacts housing availability, prevailing market rates may rise, making it difficult for disaster victims to find affordable rental housing.

■ **USDA Guidelines Issued for Farm Preparedness**

Earlier this year, the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) released a series of guidelines designed to help farmers and their employees work towards securing against the threat of a terrorist attack on the nation's food supply. According to the USDA, "Improving awareness through enhanced outreach and communications is a key element of the USDA's homeland security efforts." They include best practices which can be employed through planning, security management and communication: and farmers are urged to develop a risk management plan and cooperate with local law enforcement while at the same time sharing that plan with farm employees.

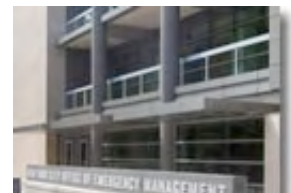

NYDIS has a designated seat in the new OEM Emergency Operations Center.

- **CDC: Disaster Plans Now Include Pets**

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) public health veterinarians recognized that there are health concerns related to involuntary pet-owner separation and animal loss (e.g., mental health/resilience issues for both victims and responders), but most important is the recognition that a lack of plans and resources to evacuate pets with their owners is a primary reason why citizens will refuse to evacuate in the face of imminent life-threatening danger. Thanks to lessons learned during Katrina, pets are now included in several states' emergency preparedness and response plans, and there is a new Federal law, the Pet Evacuation Transportation Standards (PETS) Act of 2006. It requires that state and local governments include household pets in emergency evacuation plans and authorizes the use of funds to "procure, construct, or renovate emergency shelter facilities and materials that will temporarily accommodate people with pets and service animals" and to provide "rescue, care, shelter, and essential needs...to such pets and animals."

The Government Accountability Office (GAO) found that the Defense Department (DOD) has made significant progress in planning its response to a flu pandemic, but it has more work to complete. In a recent report, GAO recommended that DOD: define and communicate roles and responsibilities, oversight mechanisms, goals and performance measures; establish a framework to request funding tied to goals; decide which types of employees to include in any vaccine or antiviral drug distribution, and communicate that information; and implement a comprehensive department-wide communications strategy.

- **NYC Cited for Preparedness in New Study**

NYC is one of two cities that are mentioned as examples for investing wisely in pandemic preparedness, based on several critical actions. These include responding to early recognition by key public and private sector leaders of the hazard and the need to aggressively prepare; obtaining elected-official support for preparedness measures; building coalitions to enhance preparedness that include the healthcare and business sectors, community-based organizations, first responders, critical infrastructure agencies, and emergency managers; reaching out to the general public through an ongoing education and information campaign, reminding the public of the need



for personal and family preparedness for all-hazards, including a flu pandemic; and recognizing that preparedness goals, activities, and resources must include the most vulnerable of our citizens.

A study published on November 23 in the New England Journal of Medicine found that because detecting Avian Flu with standard tests is so difficult and time-consuming, waiting for lab confirmation of an outbreak would cause dangerous treatment delays. - **Planning for Flu: Telework Likely**

The Government Health IT website reports that although the avian flu has shown no signs so far of having the ability to be transmitted from one person to another, federal agencies have begun planning in case it does. A slight mutation in the virus that causes avian flu could make it contagious among humans. Even if avian flu is not the source, officials say they believe another flu pandemic of some sort is likely to occur and that a much greater number of people that will be uninfected might need to telework for a longer period of time than that for which most agencies are prepared. "Agencies that provide citizen services need to factor that into their planning," said Steve Cooper, former chief information officer at DHS and now CIO at ARC, "telework plays a big role for our folks, but not for the folks we deliver services to."

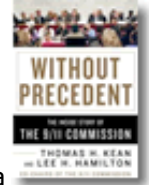

the chance to be a part of an organization that is committed to serving the public. NYC Parks beaches are open in 2007 from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day, and the pools are open from late June through Labor Day. Lifeguards work 48 hours each week.
